## Pulling Back the Curtain

There are topics that are not often discussed in depth, many which have mis-perceptions and misinformation surrounding them. One example is how your credit score is really calculated, the components that are considered, and how it effects your daily life in areas you may not be aware of.

Another area, seldom discussed, and often misunderstood, is Bankruptcy Laws. During the recent presidential election, the issue was raised when it was announced that President Donald Trump had used the Federal Bankruptcy law as a tool to improve his position with creditors, on six different occasions. The issue, rarely raised, is that the Bankruptcy Law was enacted by the United States Congress. It is available to those entities or individuals who qualify for, and choose to use it. Chrysler Corporation, General Motors, at least five major airlines, and thousands of other corporations, including a company that formerly maintained manufacturing and distribution facilities in Hagerstown - Dana Corporation - have all used it. Some have used it multiple times.

Our upcoming series will address these two issues. The series will not seek to explain the multiple complexities and reasons why corporations use the law to their advantage. It will, however, delve into the most common Bankruptcy filings affecting the average person on. When major corporations, such as General Motors file for Bankruptcy protection, there is usually 'some' public support because it saves jobs. There is often an argument to be made

that entity filing is a victim of the economy, increased production costs, and a myriad of other circumstances.

This writer hopes to address and answer questions surrounding the most commonly used Chapters of the Bankruptcy Law (Chapter 7 and Chapter 13) used by everyday citizens. Readers will be exposed to a thumbnail sketch of what happens when an individual files - advantages; disadvantages; individual rights; and the rights of creditors. Readers will learn from an attorney who specializes in Bankruptcy cases, and another which frequently represents the interests of creditors. This writer will follow a few actual cases, as debtors appear in court, to provide readers a broader view of the types of issues, questions, and impacts faced by both debtors and creditors.

There are many reasons individuals end up in Bankruptcy court - divorce, job loss, illness, and addiction, to name a few. One of the biggest reasons involves individuals borrowing more than they can repay. The percentage of people who end up in Bankruptcy court, and want to be there, is minuscule. However, filers are there none-the-less, facing the embarrassment and humiliation that comes with financial over reach.

One big difference between personal and business bankruptcy filings is that individual filers are often judged in the court of public opinion, as well as Federal Court. This series is judgment-free. The purpose is only to inform and educate.

#### NOTICE OF ORDINANCE ADOPTION

Notice is hereby given that the Hagerstown Town Council, pursuant to I.C. § 36-7-4-606, passed and adopted the following Ordinances concerning the zoning regulations and zoning maps of the geographical area under the Hagerstown Advisory Plan Commission at a public meeting held September 18, 2017. The Ordinances, by title only, are as follows:

Ordinance No. 7-2017, an Ordinance amending certain sections of Town Code Chapter 151 Zoning and Subdivision Control, repealing Sections 151.001 through 151.924, inclusive, except for Section 151.201, and replacing each deletion with Chapter 151 Zoning and Subdivision Control Ordinance, Sections 151.001 through 151.924, inclusive, except for Section 151.201, and including the following penalty provisions as set forth in Section 151.835(A) Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an Ordinance violation and shall be subject to a fine of up to \$2,500.00 per violation. Each and every day during which a violation continues may be deemed a separate violation. (B) Enforcement proceedings pursuant to this section shall be brought in the name of the Town of Hagerstown by the Town Attorney, or his designate. (C) A person, firm or corporation against whom a judgment is entered pursuant to this section is liable for all costs associated with prosecuting the violation(s). Additionally, Section 151.836 reads as follows: The Town of Hagerstown may initiate a suit for injunction in the Wayne County Circuit Court or Superior Court to restrain an individual, firm, corporation or a governmental unit from violating the provisions of this Ordinance. The Town of Hagerstown may also initiate a suit for a mandatory injunction directing an individual, firm, corporation or a governmental unit to remove a structure erected in violation of the provisions of this Ordinance and if the Town is successful in its suit the respondent shall bear the cost of the action.

Ordinance No. 8-2017, an Ordinance amending Town Code Title XV, Land Usage, also known as Chapter 151 Zoning Code, Section 151.201 Zoning Maps, in its entirety, and replacing it with Section 151.201 Zoning Map.
