If someone were to ask me to share one of my favorite Dance With Cindy memories, I would have to respond with "Hometown Christmas!" There's something incredibly special about a local dance studio performing traditional holiday music in an elementary gym on a Saturday morning in December. Side note: I love Christmas music and dances!

One of my best memories of DWC-HC was the 2011 holiday show after I'd had my knee replacement. It was the start of my feeling like myself again. Not only was I entertained but I was uplifted by the community of support surrounding me.

Our very first Hometown Christmas show took place in the museum. Hagerstown had a Chamber of Commerce and my mother was a member. She thought it would be a good idea for DWC to share the cheer. We did several small shows throughout the day, dragging our boxes of snowflakes and tambourines down the street from the studio and up the stairs to the museum.

For those of you who only know Hometown Christmas on a half of a basketball floor, it might be hard to imagine us on the museum's small stage.

In the '80's, there was a craft fair associated with Hometown Christmas, held in the high school cafeteria. DWC put on a show in the auditorium, where the big girls proudly danced to "Kay Thompson's Jingle Bells" and "Santa Claus is Coming" was first performed by the little kids, including Tod Baker, the only DWC student to become a professional dancer.

How many generations of my DWC family can sing that

Another perennial rite-of-passage is "Mrs. Santa Claus" by Nat King Cole. It usually holds the hallowed place in the program of the second-to-last dance.

This coming Saturday, December 2nd is our 2017 show. We start at 10:30 am with all of Miss Lisa's tumblers, followed by the dance students. Together, we close the show with an accapella version of "We Wish You a Merry Christmas."

While most of our selections are classic holiday fare, this year, we took the FootSteps dancers on a different journey. I found a recording of Maya Angelou reading her Christmas poem: "Amazing Peace." As teachers, Lisa Bane and I discussed the pros and cons of doing a dance routine that is choreographed to only words. We knew it would be challenging without music as our group ranges in age from one second grader to a handful of seniors. We decided to give it a go and I'm glad we took the chance to try something daring.

Christmas is a time to look back and at the same time, look ahead. Parents of the little ones watch the big girls dancing to "Merry Christmas Darling" or "Mr. Heat Miser" and think of how quickly the time flies before their tutu-ed dancers do pirouettes or time steps while at the same time, the families of the older girls watch "Santa's Bag of Toys" or "Must be Santa" and wonder where the time went.

For me, the ho-ho-holiday season officially begins with "Ho-ho-hometown Christmas."

# Lady Falcons Solidify Hold on TEC

WINCHESTER - The Winchester Lady Falcons are head and shoulders above the other TEC basketball teams, both figuratively and literally. The tall and talented Lady Falcons, currently ranked eighth in the 2A poll, ran up an 18-0 lead before the Lady Tigers finally got a field goal from Beth Jenkins, with 35 seconds remaining in first quarter. It got worse from there. Applying pressure and controlling the boards, the Lady Falcons outscored Hagerstown 22-3 in the second quarter, to take a 40-5 lead to halftime.

All-state candidate, and defending Tri-Eastern Conference player of the year, Maddie Lawrence, led the charge and she had plenty of help. Lawrence scored eight points in the second quarter, three of her teammates scored four points or more, while holding the Lady Tigers to a single three-point field goal from Hallie Rogers.

Lady Falcon Head Coach Holly Gutierrez, who does not subscribe to the theory of "what goes around comes around" stayed with her starters and her press in the third quarter. Lawrence scored seven more points in the period while Becca Chamberlin and 6'4" post Kira Robinson added five points each.

The Tigers fought back with an 11-point quarter. The Falcons stayed with regulars for most of the final period, while the Tigers went with a youth movement. Freshman Makayla Matanich hit a three-pointer in her Varsity debut. Freshman Kaley Farmer added 6 points and 6 rebounds. Freshman Kenzie Neely also hit a three-pointer in the most competi-

tive period of the game. Madison Brown led the Lady Tigers with eight points. Lawrence scored 17 for the Lady Falcons. Chamberlin and Robinson each added 15, Shelby Miller 13 and Hannah Graft 11. Lady Tiger senior Taylor Kelley sat out with an injury.

The final score was 77-31. It was the largest losing margin the Lady Tigers have suffered in nearly 15 years. Lady Tiger Head Coach Chris Oliger was not discouraged. "Winchester is very good," Oliger said. "They were without question the better team tonight. They beat us up pretty good. Cassidy (Oliger) has an enormous knot on her face from an elbow. We played hard, but they were just better and there is no other way to say it."

Oliger went on to make a promise. "They are probably good enough to win a state title. Especially, if they can develop some depth. We will probably see them again in the Sectional and I promise you that if we do, we will be competitive. We will learn a lot from this game. They are incredibly physical, and Maddie Lawrence can flat play. I was pleased with the play from our younger kids tonight and If we see them again in two months you will see growth in our team."

## Life Insurance Policy Locator Finds \$600,000 for Hoosiers

Thousands of U.S. consumers have reaped the benefits of the Indiana Department of Insurance's and the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Life Insurance Policy Locator during the locator's first year.

In Indiana, 144 beneficiaries have been matched with \$609,591.72 total claims since its launch last November.

The consumer tool has matched 8,210 beneficiaries with lost or misplaced life insurance policies or annuities nationwide - totaling \$92.5 million returned to consumers.

"Regulators identified the mounting problem of lost policies and worked together to design this resource to help consumers find money that is owed to them," said Indi-

ana Department of Insurance Commissioner Stephen W. Robertson in a news release. "We encourage Hoosiers to log in to see if they are owed money."

#### TOWN OF ECONOMY ORDINANCE

##### Chapter 5.17 GARBAGE AND WEEDS

##### 5.17.010 Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following terms have the following meanings unless otherwise designated:

- "Town" means the Town Council of Economy, Indiana
- "Garbage" means putrescible animal and vegetable wastes, resulting from handling, preparation, cooking and consumption of food; refuse; and rubbish.
- "Owner" means a person holding legal title to real property within the Town of Economy.
- "Person" means an individual, partnership, corporation, trust, or any commercial association or venture, however defined.
- "Putrescible" means substances which are subject to organic decomposition.
- "Recyclable materials" means those materials designated by the Town or its designee as those which may be collected for recycling purposes. Such materials may include, but may not be limited to, aluminum products, clean glass containers, bimetal containers, newspapers, magazines and periodicals, and plastic containers. What constitutes "recyclable materials" may change depending on what the Town or its designee is able to dispose of through its recycling efforts.
- "Refuse" means all putrescible and nonputrescible solid wastes, including animal wastes, garbage, rubbish, ashes, street cleanings, and solid market and industrial wastes.
- "Rubbish" means nonputrescible solid wastes consisting of both combustible and noncombustible wastes, such as paper, cardboard, tin cans, wood, glass, bedding, crockery, construction debris, and similar materials.
- "Weed" means any plant or vegetation classified as a detrimental plant, invasive plant or noxious weed by either the state under authority of IC 15, entitled Agriculture and Animals, or the United States government in accordance with 7 USC 7701.
- "Yard waste" means grass, weeds, leaves, brush, tree trimmings, hedge clippings, and other yard and garden materials.

##### 5.17.020 Deposit of garbage & rubbish.

It is unlawful for any person to throw, place, or scatter any garbage, rubbish, recyclable materials or yard waste over or upon any premises, street, alley, either public or private, or to suffer or permit any garbage, rubbish, recyclable materials or yard waste to be placed or deposited on the premises owned, occupied or controlled by such person either with or without the intent to later remove, cover, or burn it. This provision shall not restrict the filling of low lands within the town with brick, stone, sand, gravel, cold ashes, or dirt.

##### 5.17.030 Excessive growth.

It is unlawful for the owner of any lot or tract of ground within the town to allow it to become overgrown with weeds, grass, or noxious plants beyond the height of eight inches or to such extent that the growth is detrimental to the public health and constitutes a nuisance.

##### 5.17.040 Inspections.

It shall be the duty of the Town or its designee to make a careful inspection of any lots, grounds and tracts of land situated within the corporate limits of the town for the purpose of determining whether there is a violation of this chapter.

##### 5.17.050 Enforcement procedures.

(a) If the Town or any other designee of the Town determines that there is a violation of this ordinance, the Town shall issue a notice of violation (NOV) to the responsible party. For purposes of issuing a NOV, the following persons shall be considered responsible parties, with liability for fines and responsibility for remedy of the violation: persons with any possessory interest in the property; property owner(s); and/or any persons who have caused the violation.

Liability for fines shall not attach to nonpossessory property owner(s) for a period of seven days following issuance of the NOV, provided that the nonpossessory property owner(s) presents to the Town, within seven days after issuance of the NOV, a true and exact copy of any and all leases in effect during the time period covered by the NOV.

(b) The NOV shall be in writing and shall be served on one or more of the responsible parties in one or more of the following manners: delivery in person; by first class mail; and/or by placement in a conspicuous place on the property where a violation occurs. The notice shall state:

- (1) The location of the violation;
- (2) The nature of the violation;
- (3) The period of correction (if any);
- (4) The fine assessed for the violation;
- (5) Additional remedies the town may seek for violation (including abatement of the violation by the Town or by a private contractor hired by the Town) after the seven-day period of the NOV);
- (6) That the fine is to be paid to the Town of Economy;
- (7) That the fine may be contested in the Wayne County Circuit Courts;
- (8) That the NOV may be appealed to the Town, provided the appeal is in writing and received by the Town no later than seven days from the date of the NOV.

(c) Schedule of Fines. The initial penalty or fine for all violations of this ordinance shall be fifty dollars(\$50). A second violation of this ordinance in any twelve-month period shall be subject to a penalty or fine of one hundred dollars (\$100). A third and all subsequent violations of this ordinance in any twelve-month period shall be subject to a penalty or fine of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150). The twelve-month period described above shall begin on August 1 of each year and end on July 31 of the following year.

(d) If the responsible party fails to pay any accumulated fines, the Town may collect said fines in any manner authorized by law.

##### 5.17.060 Failure to remedy.

(a) Any property owner still in violation of a NOV after the correction period, will be subject of an abatement request by the Town. The property owner shall be notified of the request; said notice shall state the following:

- (1) The location of the violation;
- (2) The nature of the violation;
- (3) A statement that abatement of the violation is being sought;
- (4) A statement that the abatement may be provided by the town or by a private third-party contractor hired by the town to perform the abatement;
- (5) A statement that the property owner will be liable for any and all costs associated with the town, and/or the town's contractor, abating the property;
- (6) A statement that if the property owner fails to reimburse the town for any and all costs associated with an abatement of their property, said costs shall be filed with the appropriate county official and placed on the tax duplicate for the property at issue; said costs being collected as taxes are collected;
- (7) The date, time and location of the Town's hearing regarding the abatement request; and
- (8) A statement indicating that the property owner is entitled to appear at said hearing and is entitled to present arguments and evidence in his/her defense at said hearing. The abatement notice described in the above subsection

(b) shall be in writing and shall be served on the property owner via certified mail, return receipt requested. If the abatement notice is returned as undeliverable the notice shall be given by personally delivering a copy of the abatement notice to the property owner; leaving a copy of the abatement notice at the usual place of abode of the property owner; sending by first class mail a copy of the abatement notice to the last known address of the property owner; or by serving the agent of the property owner.

(c) At the abatement hearing the Town shall hear evidence from all parties and render its decision in writing.

(d) All appeals from the Town's decision at a hearing on an abatement request shall be made to courts of competent jurisdiction within ten days.

(e) If an initial notice of abatement was provided in accordance with this Section, and Section 5.17.050 was first followed, a continuous abatement notice may be posted at the property at the time of abatement by certified mail. A continuous abatement notice serves as notice to the property owner that each subsequent violation of this chapter during the same twelve-month period for which the initial NOV was provided may be abated by the town or its private third-party contractors.

##### 5.17.070 Cost of Removal by Town.

If the landowner fails to remedy a violation under this ordinance, the Town Clerk/Treasurer shall make a certified statement of the actual cost incurred by the town for any abatement conducted by the town or its private third-party contractor. The statement shall be served on the property owner by certified mail, return receipt requested. The property owner shall pay the amount in the statement to the Town of Economy within ten days(10) after receiving it. If the landowner should fail to pay within the ten-day period, a certified copy of the statement of costs shall be filed in the office of the county auditor or any other appropriate county official. The said official shall place the amount claimed on the tax duplicate against the property affected by the work. The amount shall be collected and disbursed to the general fund of the town. 5.17.080 Vehicles hauling garbage.

(a) It is unlawful to transport garbage, recyclable material, yard waste, stone or other materials that are likely to fall from a vehicle unless such materials are covered and secured so as to prevent their deposit on public and private property.

(b) Any materials falling from a vehicle shall be promptly removed by the person responsible for their deposit. If such person neglects or refuses to remove the materials, the town shall cause such materials to be removed at the expense of the person responsible, who shall be liable to pay the town the cost of the removal.
